

December 2025 Orgy® Season

Legend has it that the WHRB Orgy® tradition began over eighty years ago, in the spring of 1943. At that time, it is said that one Harvard student, then a staff member of WHRB, returned to the station after a particularly difficult exam and played all of Beethoven's nine symphonies consecutively (from 78 rpm records) to celebrate the end of a long, hard term of studying. The idea caught on, and soon the Orgy® concept was expanded to include live jazz, rock, hip-hop, blues, and even sports Orgies®.

The Orgy® tradition lives on today at WHRB. During the Reading and Exam Periods of Harvard College, WHRB presents marathon-style musical programs devoted to a single composer, performer, genre, or subject.

THE D'ANGELO ORGY

'So when I came out, everyone would ask me, 'What do you call what you do?' and I would say soul music. Not neo-soul but soul. Soul - it's like you either got it or you don't. ... And [neosoul] also puts us in a box, it puts us right back in the box we

were tryna get out of in the first place." – D'Angelo Michael Eugene Archer, professionally known as D'Angelo, was one of the most pioneering artists of the modern age of music. His sonic depth was responsible for the creation of a new genre of music, Neo-Soul, which bridged the foundational sound of Soul and Blues and the improvisational nature of Jazz into a brand new art form. Challenging the limits of what soul could be, D'Angelo and the Soulquarians – Questlove, Erykah Badu, Mos Def, and others - were a vanguard of avant-garde, soulful, and socially-conscious music at a time when the nation seemed to be more discordant than ever. The innovative sessions at Electric Lady Studios were the birthing ground for a sound that ushered the Black musical tradition into the 21st Century.

5:00 am THE APPLE OF MY EYE -- A BITE OF SHEENA RINGO

Sheena Ringo's music is Crisp and Delicious. Debuting in 1999 with Muzai Moratorium at just 19 years old, Ringo has been an icon in the Japanese music industry ever since. THE B.B. KING CENTENNIAL ORGY

WHRB's Blues Department honors the King of Blues in the year of his 100th birthday. The Mississippi Delta-born singer, songwriter, and record producer B. B. King (1925-2015) has been recognized as "the single most important electric guitarist of the last half of the 20th century.

We start with 1950s jazz, enter the folk revival era in the 1960s, play the disco music of the 1970s, present 1980s hip hop, focus on the rise of alternative music in the 1990s, and then play NYC hits of the 2000s. We will celebrate the diversity of New York City with the songs from different boroughs and neighborhoods.

Tuesday, December 2

3:00 am THE PERFORMATIVE MAN

Leave the matcha and Labubu at home: in this Orgy®, we'll be exploring the people who turned music performance itself into an art form. Beginning with the glam era, we'll hear how musicians first embraced costume, glitter, and theatrical persona to push rock's rawness closer to living theater. After hearing from the likes of David Bowie and Bryan Ferry, we'll explore how punk and post-punk redefined the focus of performance from glamour to intensity. As the Orgy® unfolds, we'll move into both more experimental takes on performance and those that blend into pop spectacle, with singers embodying exaggerated versions of masculinity and femininity, camp, and melodrama. The final hours turn to contemporary voices who reinvent these traditions, blurring gender lines, collapsing genres, and treating the stage as a blank canvas.

THE CRANBERRIES ORGY

This Orgy® celebrates The Cranberries – their unmistakable $melodies, sharp\,emotion, and\,the\,voice\,that\,defined\,a\,generation.$ Moving through their full discography, it captures the tension between softness and strength: dreamscapes and dissonance, grief and grace. Complementary artists join the mix to expand on their themes of memory, resilience, and identity, creating a set that feels both familiar and new.

THE AARON COPLAND ORGY WHRB presents the 41-hour Aaron Copland Orgy® to commemorate the 125th anniversary of Copland's birth in 1900. Across five days, we offer the chance to trace Copland's musical journey in developing a distinctively American sound for concert music, from his early European-influenced works, to his jazz-tinged modernism in the 1920s, to more abstract works of the late 1920s and early 1930s, to spacious Americana in the 1930s and 1940s, to his excursions into serialism in the 1950s and 1960s. The Orgy® represents a rare opportunity in this anniversary year to explore his entire body of music, ranging from favorites such as Appalachian Spring and Fanfare for the Common Man, to other highly regarded works such as the Piano Variations and the Piano Fantasy, to lesser-heard gems and arrangements. Copland's style was incredibly eclectic and evolved constantly over his life, and his music was a microcosm of many of the musical developments of the 20th century. 1:00 am IT GETS LONGER AND LONGER

Music comes in so many shapes and sizes. There are long songs, short songs, medium songs, and all the other songs in between. In this Orgy®, we'll take a look at music with all sorts of timestamps, starting with those under a minute and gradually moving towards the four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, maybe even ten minute mark. And with each passing minute, we will have more fun thinking about time, music, and the other important parts of life.

5:00 am THE BIGGEST YEAR IN AMERICAN MUSIC: JAZZ IN 1959

Perhaps the greatest year in American music is 1959, when years of relationships brewed into some of the greatest combos in jazz history and later into the most influential albums in the genre. Records such as "Kind of Blue" and "Time Out" defined not only the year but the entire genre of modal jazz that evolved into what we understand as modern American jazz. Modal jazz played a large role in soul, folk, rock, and pop genres, leading the way for artists such as Michael Jackson and Stevie Wonder. Without 1959, American music in the latter half of the 20th century as we know today could never have happened.

PAKISTAN'S WESTERN MUSIC SCENE 10:00 pm

The music scene in Pakistan was at a peak during the 1990s to the late 2000s. Many emerging rock and indie bands adopted Western music styles into traditional Pakistani vocals. Pakistani music has often been spiritual and devotional, with artists like Nusrat Fateh Ali. However, as the Western sphere grew into global popularity, artists in Pakistan began incorporating and collaborating with the West. Even traditional singers like Nusrat Fateh Ali began to use Western music as an influence, collaborating with famous singers like Peter Gabriel and playing shows in New York City. Meanwhile, Pakistani bands like Noori and Zeb & Haniya created songs using guitar and vocals tapping into the indie rock genre. This Orgy® aims to introduce a Western audience into the Pakistani music scene, and to draw similarities between two groups from across the world.
