10:00 pm THE GUIDED BY VOICES ORGY

For over thirty years, Guided By Voices made stripped-down, intelligent songs, often using only a four-track recorder. Best known for their 1994 landmark LP Bee Thousand, the group has released twenty-two full-length albums to date, in addition to a large number of EPs and box sets. Robert Pollard, the group's prolific songwriter and sole continuous band member, was a schoolteacher at the time of the band's formation in Dayton, Ohio in the mid-eighties. Eventually he decided to quit his day job and focus on the band, a move that would alter the landscape of the underground music world forever. The GBV catalogue is raw and generally lo-fi, with elements of garage rock, psychedelic rock, punk, and post-punk. Songs are often no more than two minutes in duration and albums can feel like sonic collages, with tracks moving abruptly from one to the other or connected by eerie "found-sound" transitions. We will work our way through the extensive catalogue of a profoundly influential band that became synonymous with lo-fi recording and underground rock.

OSTROCK: THE ROCK OF EASTERN GERMANY

East German rock is surprisingly diverse, considering the communist government that was in power at the time. But influenced by British, American, and German rock heard over the radio waves from West Germany, East German rock was also able to explore different flavors of rock, from rockabilly to artrock, assuming, of course, the lyrics didn't stray too far for the Stasi. Unsurprisingly, the punk scene was not so lucky. Unlike other genres, punk music was heavily policed, especially after the "Härte gegen Punk" strategy was implemented by the government. Many band members were arrested, breaking up many punk bands, while others instead chose to stick to a tamer acts in order to continue playing music, perhaps under the state label, Amiga. But despite the environment, or perhaps because of it, many East German bands of all genres are still together even now, putting out new material and touring the globe.
